In preparation for that time we are being optimistic, as your District Eleven Board and the Altrusa Club of Santa Maria Altrusa moves forward with plans for a fun, informative and entertaining 2021 District Conference at the Radisson Hotel in Santa Maria, April 29 thru May 2, 2021. At our 2021 Conference you will be electing the new District Eleven Board of Directors. Your Nominating Committee will be making requests for nominations. I encourage each of you to step up and lead. You know you can do it! Let me know if you have any questions

As mentioned in my October monthly newsletter it is not necessary to have served on the District Eleven Board prior to running for Director, Second Vice Governor or First Vice Governor. To be eligible to run for Governor-Elect, however, you must have served a full term as a member of the Board.

I hope your “Make a Difference Day’ service projects will be a huge success. Be sure to share those successes on Facebook, Instagram, and the District and International websites. The more we let family, friends, acquaintances, and others know how much fun we have as Altrusans and what we do for our communities the more opportunities we have to build our membership.

Speaking of membership; we will be having a District-wide Zoom Workshop on Saturday, November 7, 2020 at 1 p.m. which will focus on retaining and increasing membership during the pandemic. Since club visits are difficult, if not impossible right now, the District Board agreed to have District-wide Zoom workshops in lieu of the type of workshops we’ve had in the past at various locations throughout the District. The District Board is offering an incentive to participate in the November Zoom workshop. Based on the number of members that join the Zoom workshop, the club will receive \$10 per member, not to exceed \$200 per club.-Plan to join on November 7th.

By now you are all aware that the venue and date for the 2021 International Convention has been changed. Instead of Quebec City, Canada the Convention will be held in Charlotte, North Carolina due to the COVID-19 travel restrictions into Canada. The date of the Convention is now from July 28 thru August 1, 2021. A change in the venue and date should in no way diminish your enthusiasm to attend. There is always so much to learn at Convention, as well as the opportunity to meet Altrusans from all over the world. Learning about all the things Altrusa does around the world only reinforces that we are part of something worldwide and so very worthwhile. Let’s hope that the New Zealand travel restrictions have been lifted by Convention time so Altrusans from New Zealand will be there with the rest of us.

Don’t forget the Altrusa Video Challenge being encouraged by the Altrusa International Service Program Development Committee. Clubs are being asked to video their club’s community service activities to tell the world about Altrusa and all we do. Selected videos will be featured at the 2021 International Convention. Details about the challenge are provided in this DSB. Look for it.

The year 2021 is shaping up to be a busy one for Altrusans. Busy with continued community service projects and attending the District Conference in April/May and the International Convention in July/August. So put the Conference and the Convention on your 2021 calendars now. You won’t want to miss them.

Despite COVID-19 District Eleven has been able to welcome a new club into the District. Altrusa International of Reno/Sparks initiated their 15th member and are at charter strength. During these unprecedented times, they like all our clubs, continued to reach out to their community to provide assistance and relief whenever possible and continued to invite individuals to learn about Altrusa and invited those who responded to join their club. Credit for this new club goes to Courtney Voight current club president of Reno/Sparks, Gail Swain, New Club Building Chair and most certainly to past Governor Melanie Hodges who, during her biennium, helped get the Reno/Sparks Club in Formation started. Thank you, Melanie, Gail, and Courtney. The charter ceremony will take place sometime this Spring when all the members of the Reno/Sparks Club, District Eleven Board members and others feel comfortable participating in an in-person celebration and ceremony.

We are also building a new “virtual club” within our District. A special thank you to Gail Swain, New Club Building Chair, Danielle Robello, president of the Altrusa Club of Chula Vista and Julie Robello for getting our first virtual club started in District Eleven. I encourage each of our clubs to reach out to Gail and Danielle to help ensure the success of this club. More about the plans and projects is included in a separate article in the DSB.

Wrapping up, I would like to express my appreciation and that of the District Eleven Board for your continued support of the two International Service Projects; Days for Girls (DFG) and Support our Soldiers (SOS). PLAN TO BE INVOLVED



As a District Officer, I have had the opportunity and pleasure of visiting several Altrusa Clubs. This has allowed me to meet numerous members that I would not have connected with otherwise. Also, it has shown me a variety of Club projects that support our diverse communities. I have met

the Altrusa leaders who have imagined, developed, and implemented these projects. Wow, what great innovators! Their leadership skills can and should be utilized at the District level.

Every two years (each biennium), the District elects a new Board. The District Board is composed of: Governor, Governor-Elect, 1st Vice Governor, 2nd Vice Governor, one Director, Treasurer, Immediate Past Governor, serving as team liaison, and the appointed positions of Secretary and Parliamentarian.

To be eligible for election for any District Office, members must be, at the time of nomination and election an active member in good standing.

To be eligible for election to the office Governor-Elect, the candidate shall have previously served a full term (more than half of a two-year term) as a member of the District Board.

To be eligible for election to any District Office other than Treasurer, a person must have completed a full term as Club President or be serving as Club President at the time of the election.

To be eligible for election as District Treasurer, a person must have completed a full term as Club President or Club Treasurer or be serving as the same at the time of the election and also must have general accounting knowledge or experience.

Only two people from each Club can be on the District Board during any one term. If you are interested in serving on the District Eleven Board, contact our 2021-2023 Nominating Committee that is made up of Chairman, Koni Shaff, and members, Margee Neer and Jan Riggins.

To be eligible to be a District Committee Chair, one must be a member in good standing. They are appointed by the incoming District Governor. Therefore, let the

Governor Elect, Melinda Aguirre, know you are interested in serving as a District Committee Chair.

Personally, I joined the Tucson Club in 2004 as a member and enjoyed being involved with our projects so much that I soon volunteered to be a Club Committee Chair. Since that time, I have served my Club as a Director, Corresponding Secretary, Membership Chair, Service Chair, Foundation Treasurer, President Elect, and President. At the District level, I have been a Co-Workshop presenter, Director, 2nd Vice Governor, and currently am 1st Vice Governor.

I have enjoyed every step in my service to the Tucson Club and District Eleven. Besides serving, a big plus is cultivating great relationships with Altrusans that I will cherish my entire life!

It has certainly been a crazy year, hasn't it? Fundraising efforts for many of us have ground to a slow trickle and our Altrusa clubs are using up reserves to continue to give service in our communities. To assist in keeping up your service momentum, I encourage you to consider applying for grants from Altrusa International Foundation.

For club service projects, use the “Project Grant Application”. There are two grant cycles per years – due dates of March 15th and September 15th – for which you may apply for grants in the amounts of \$250 up to \$4,000. And you may apply in every grant cycle! If your club has not received such a grant in the past, I urge you to apply! It is a great way to make a big impact in your community!

Altrusa International Foundation also awards “Individual Grants” for assisting an “individual to improve the quality of his/her life through continued education”. This grant also has two cycles with the same due dates and may award up to \$4,000 to the individual.

Club 21 Program grants are awarded to groups whose mission is to address health or literacy concerns of children and families through domestic camps and international projects. For example, if your community has a summer camp for disabled youth, you could apply for a grant to assist them.

The Altrusa International Foundation Disaster Relief Fund grants timely assistance to our local organizations in times of disasters (Covid-19 needs qualify). There are no cycle due dates, but when disaster strikes; your club can apply for assistance to aid your local community's needs. Grant requests of \$1,000 can receive immediate funding; larger grant requests go through a more lengthy approval process.

LITERACY – Sandy Pfefferkorn



Greetings All! As Altrusan one of our primary focuses is to assist in improving the literacy of children. This has become more paramount with the continuing pandemic, and has created a great many barriers to education. Reading is a simple way to keep students minds stimulated and

focused during this global upheaval. Not only does reading feed students intellect and curiosity toward the world, it also aids in the development of crucial skills such as analytical thinking, creativity, and comprehension. The Pandemic has caused students to be at risk for becoming deprived entirely of their education.

We must collectively put our minds to work and come up with safe and viable ways to assist as many, at risk, students as we can. This has become difficult due to the restrictions placed upon us by Covid- 19. We can contribute to the future success of our youth by assisting them with “At Home Reading”. Educators recommend that students read or be read to from 30 to 60 minutes daily. At Home Reading is extremely important. By providing books to children we can assist in improving literacy. Some ways to do this would be:

- Spearhead a “Friends and Family Book Drive”; reach out to your friends and families. Ask for donations of gently used no longer read

children’s and teen books. Collect, organize, and look for places to donate the books. Deliver to schools for take home reading, Boys and Girls clubs, Y’s, or Daycare centers.

- Have a “Virtual Book Drive”; ask for donations of new books or funds to purchase books. As Altrusa is a 501C-3 these donations are tax deductible. These could also be donated to schools, Foster Homes, anywhere there is a need.
- If your group is crafty you can make Reading Buddy’s or Critters for the kids to read to. The Buddy’s or Critters could be handed out with the books or independently.

We are a very creative bunch and should be able to create programs that work for our individual clubs and the needs of our communities.

Stay safe and healthy. Remember, “Reading fosters literacy and literacy ultimately changes lives.



Nominating Committee News – Koni Shaff



It's time to request nominations for District Eleven Officers to be elected for the 2021-2023 biennium. Elections will be held at our April/May 2021 Conference in Santa Maria, California. In accordance with District Eleven By-Laws and Policies, nominations are being solicited for the offices of

Governor Elect, First Vice Governor, Second Vice Governor, Director, and Treasurer. To be eligible for election to any District Eleven office, the nominee must be, at the time of nomination and election, an active Altrusa member in good standing. To be eligible for election to the office of Governor Elect, the candidate shall have previously served a term (more than half of two-year term) as a member of the District Board.

To be eligible for a District Eleven office, except Treasurer, a person must have served, or be serving a full term as Club President. Treasurer must have served or be serving as the same at the time of election, and also must have good accounting and/or Quick Books knowledge or experience. A nomination form will be sent to all District Eleven Club Presidents.

We urge you to participate in this very important process. Nominations must be post marked no later than November 30, 2020. If you would like to be considered for a District Eleven Board office, please make sure you let your Club President know. The Nominating Committee will rely on your recommendations in preparing a slate to be submitted to the District Eleven Board of Directors for their approval at the January 2021 Board Meeting, and as approved, published in the Call to Conference issue of the District Service Bulletin.

DISTRICT ELEVEN DISASTER RELIEF GRANTS

The COVID-19 pandemic has had a huge impact on the communities of District Eleven. Many of the clubs assisted their community partners by applying to Altrusa International Foundation for a disaster relief grant.

ANAHEIM

Pathways of Hope provides meals and food through the HUB of Hope food distribution and resource center in North Orange county, CA. Anaheim, the largest city in North Orange County, CA has tripled its homeless population in the last few years. An intensive census of homeless people in 13 cities found 2107 people experiencing homelessness. The population of Orange County is 3.5 million. It is the third largest county in California and the fifth largest county in the nation. It serves 100 struggling households each day with emergency food and supplies to keep them safe.

The impact of the COVID-19 has caused the need to grow substantially with parents being told to stay home from work and children home from school and school nutritional programs unavailable because of the spreading of the disease. In addition, Disneyland, Knotts Berry Farm, surrounding hotels and restaurants have closed their doors resulting in layoffs. The POH staff and volunteers are pre-packaging food bags daily which are distributed to neighbors. They are currently serving over 100 struggling households each day with this emergency food and supplies. The HUB relies on food and supply donations from churches, local businesses, grocery stores, bakeries and restaurants. These denotations have dried up with the closing for churches and businesses and the panic draining of the local grocery stores. Monetary

donations have also dried up due to concern over longevity of jobs and fear of running out of money as the epidemic continues. \$1000 grant from the disaster relief fund allow the HUB to provide over 200 community members with food and supply relief.

Another great risk from the COVID-19 virus is the unprecedented number of people who are at risk of becoming homeless due to loss of jobs. Pathways runs an emergency Homeless Prevention Program that offers services like emergency rental assistance to households at risk to becoming homeless.

Altrusa International of Anaheim, Inc. requested and received a \$1000 disaster relief grant from Altrusa International Foundation to support the work being done by the staff and volunteers of Pathways of Hope.

CENTRAL COAST

Santa Maria, California is a small agricultural town with many essential workers on the lowest end of the economic scale. In this time of COVID-19, poverty is a significant issue and the heavy impact on the Santa Barbara County Food Bank, Santa Maria Division, is crushing. Virtually every day of the week, this worthwhile organization provides locations and volunteers to help keep local residents from going hungry during the pandemic. This has been a significant strain on local resources.

Altrusa International of Central Coast, Inc. has chosen to donate \$1000 of our service project funding to support the local food distributions. They have requested and received \$1000 disaster relief grant to support the organization in providing necessary food for the people of the Santa Maria Valley.

GOLDEN VALLEY

Two favorite projects of the Altrusa International of Golden Valley are “Smiles for Seniors” and THRIVE, which is a community program the club has been supporting for years. Once a month Altrusans give books to families when they come to pick up food bags. The club also donates and helps to serve two dinners for the families every year.

“Smiles for Seniors” is a senior day care center. Golden Valley members partner with their ASTRA Club of El Camino Jr. High School to do projects with the seniors. When COVID-19 came along, they were unable to actively support their projects. The club donated \$5,000.00 to feed families served by the THRIVE program. They requested and received \$1000 to go to “Brown Bags” for seniors through the Santa Barbara County Food Bank.

US census data shows 72% of the US is white, 16% Latino and 12% is black. According to the CDC, the racial breakdown of coronavirus patients shows that 45% of hospitalized patients were white, 8 % Latino and 33% black. The statics show that a disproportionate number of blacks are affected by the COVID-19.

LOS ANGELES

Altrusa International of Los Angeles, Inc. focuses on “Helping People Help People” improves our local communities through leadership, partnership and service. The Altrusans felt it was their duty to step up during these challenging times to help protect our most vulnerable community members.. They decided the best way to help would be to distribute masks to the members of the black community in the Los Angeles area.

The club has partnered with Maskeraiders, an organization of dedicated women who are volunteering their time and material to make masks for those in need. The Altrusans received a \$1000 disaster relief grant from Altrusa International Foundation which was donated to Maskeraiders to make 200 masks for the Black Community.

SAN DIEGO

The Jacobs & Cushman San Diego Food Bank and North County Food Bank chapter comprise the largest hunger-relief organization in San Diego County. Last year the Food Bank distributed 28 million pounds of food and serves an average of 350,000 people per month.

During COVID-19 pandemic, it has a greater need with school closures; many families are in desperate need of help to augment the programs additional food to the families. The food bank is meeting this need through a program entitled “Pandemic EBT – Getting Help Buying Food While Schools are Closed.”

One of the Altrusa International of San Diego, Inc. favorite literacy programs is Mentoring Student Readers at Marshall Elementary” which is a school that benefits from the Pandemic EBT program. Members of the San Diego club annually volunteer at the distribution center as one of their Make a Difference Day projects. The San Diego Club received a \$1,000 grant for their International Foundation to help make a difference to the community needs during this current crisis.

SAN LUIS OBISPO

Altrusa International of San Luis Obispo County, Inc. is very thankful for receiving \$1,000 from Altrusa International Foundation Disaster Relief Fund to help the efforts of a local organization - the 5Cities Homeless Coalition. Their need for assistance is greater now than ever during the Coronavirus pandemic; to not only help the homeless with shelter, food and securing housing, but to also help with controlling the spread of this virus through providing hygiene supplies and masks.

We have worked closely with this organization for many years by sharing holiday cheer with gifts of clothing, toys and books to families who are struggling with homelessness, giving monetary and food donations, and helping with their fundraising efforts so they can continue the important programs they offer in South San Luis Obispo County. With our \$1,000 donation, and other donations received from our community, 5CHC was able to house 4 families, prevent eviction for 8 families affected by COVID-19, and provided food, water, hygiene supplies and masks to more than 50 people ages 18 to 87 living in encampments or sheltering -in-place at a local campground. This was our opportunity to help our community in need during this tragic pandemic.


THE WEST VALLEY

Altrusa International of the West Valley, Inc. requested and received a \$1000 relief grant for the Valley View Community Food Bank. The food bank is committed to doing as much as possible to serve the needs of their diverse community and serves over 400 people a day. They provide good and wholesome nutritious food boxes to their customers.

TUCSON

Since its charter in 1941, the Tucson Club has supported its community in a variety of ways. The Community Food Bank of Southern Arizona is a club favorite. They began by giving books to the children of the families using the food bank. Recently, the executive director of the food bank attended a business meeting and was their program speaker. The members were touched and began bringing food for the foodbank.

Before the pandemic, 17% of people in Arizona did not know where they would get their next meal. The number has increased due to job losses and school closures. 33% of families and individuals live just above the poverty line and do not qualify for food stamps. The Tucson club collects peanut butter, rice, beans and other food staples from members, friends and family. They also received a \$1000 grant from Altrusa International Foundation which provided 3500 meals during this time of crisis.



SPONOR RECOGNITION PINS

Congratulations and welcome to all our new members and those who sponsored the new members. Membership is the heart of Altrusa and we all need to continue to grow our clubs for our communities and for Altrusa. Those who sponsored new members are being acknowledged and commended with the reintroduction of the "Sponsor Recognition Pins" by Beverly Hardy, International President. Sponsor Pins recognize members who have sponsored two or more new members. The pins are in the shape of even-numbers. They are awarded to members in increments of two until they reach the number eight. A new pin has been introduced called the "Altrusa Gold Medal" for a member who has sponsored ten or more new members beginning in June 2009. Recipients of the Altrusa Gold Medal are listed below. 

Projects

[Machi-ko AC](#) is a nonprofit in Mexico that supports the indigenous peoples of the Sierra Tarahumara in Chihuahua, MX. The tribes' practices in growing their crops has become obsolete as their climate has changed drastically over the years. The mission of Machi-ko AC is to help the tribes become self-sustainable again while retaining their culture and traditions by teaching them new ways of agriculture and raising livestock, building trade between the tribes, and bringing them renewable energy sources and drinking water. Their newest plans include building a kindergarten with curriculum based on community and sustainability and developing a suicide prevention program as they have the highest rate of youth suicide in Mexico due to the lack of income, jobs, and a sense of purpose. We want to donate building supplies and education materials for their school, along with 40 solar energy Luci Lights so the children may learn at all hours of the day.

Esperanza Casa de Retiro is a retirement home in Ensenada, MX. What was originally planned to be a fun place to retire became a home for sick elderly as the residents aged. We want to support these seniors by equipping them with medical supplies, such as oxygen converters and glucose strips and meters; creating a more comfortable environment with waterproof mattresses and hospital beds; and protecting their health with medical masks, gloves, and everyday cleaning supplies.



[Comisión Unidos](#) is a nonprofit in Mexico fully funded by private donations that focuses on helping those affected by human trafficking. They currently house 79 girls and boys in Mexico City, Colima, and Tijuana. They partner with the court system to identify children in need and provide a shelter for them as wards of the court. While at the shelters, the children are provided with prosecutors for their cases, socio-emotional support, social activities, and education. They also help the children build a support system for when they are no longer living in the shelter through supervised visits with their family and friends. Upon graduation, Comisión Unidos secures them apartments. Some of the graduates have gained college degrees, work for the court system, and one has become a professional chef. The organization also has an advocacy role, educating people about human trafficking and abuse through workshops at schools and conferences. We want to provide these children clothes, education materials, and read-aloud books for English learners.

NAVIGATING "Group Tally"

District and club memberships are run on a platform called Group Tally. District treasurers, Club Treasurers and Club Presidents need to be familiar and learn how to operate the system. As a club, you must decide how many members will have access and be in charge of updating and editing your club membership roster. I recommend that you limit "Full Administrative and Administrative" rights to only a few members at a time. For example, the President, Treasure and perhaps President Elect or Immediate Past President may have full administrative rights. The outgoing President or Treasurer should update the admin rights when a new board takes over. The rest of your membership should be granted "View Only" access.

To access group tally go to:

<https://altrusa.grouptally.com/login> or go to www.altrusa.org and got to the "Sites" tab then select group tally. I recommend using the Firefox browser as group tally is maintained specifically for it. To login in, enter your email address and password. If you do not remember your password then under "Login" select the "Set Password/Forgot Password" link. It will send

instructions on how to reset your password to your email address. If you do not know your email address, then send an email to leslie.johnson2@roadrunner.com and I will look it up for you.

The login in will take you to your club summary page and show the current group positions. To update the club officers in the "current group Positions " > Go to the "members" tab up in the column headers There will be a complete list of names of everyone who is a current paid member of your club. Each club treasurer needs to monitor the list on a regular basis especially after dues are updated and paid to verify the correct members received credit for their payment. This is a fluid documentation of ever-changing information, adding new members, removing those that have resigned, updating current member leadership positions, contact information and mailing addresses as they become known to you. This task is the full responsibility of each individual Club. However, speaking as a District Treasurer, it is also imperative that you share these updates and changes, once made on Group Tally, with your District Treasurer. Our individual Districts keep their own membership data and rosters, it is also important that the District data reconciles with that of the data on Internationals Group Tally. This can only be accomplished with your help. If a member resigns, do not change their status to "Inactive." An International Associate will make the change after they have gone two years without paying dues. If they are marked "Inactive" then all of their information will be deleted. If a member passes away, select the "Inactive" and then the "Deceased" option.

To update your officers > click on the name of the person to which you are adding a job > Under their name you will see "Group Membership" There will be two columns "District Eleven" and your club name. Under your club name, select the "Add leadership Position" and a screen will come up. Under "Position" use the drop down to select the desired position (there is a custom window to create ones that are not available such as "Literacy Chair" or "Foundation President." Once the position is selected, enter a "start date" usually June 1 for the Altrusa year and leave the "end" date open until their job is complete.

Next to "Leadership Position" you will see "Administrative Role." Select "Edit" next to their leadership role and select "Full Admin", "Admin" or "Member." Full Admin and Admin give them editing capabilities while member only allows them to view the information. Every club member should be able to view the club's information.

You will find more detailed user information, such as login instructions, choosing payment methods and making membership payments, on the District Website. When you login select the “Resources” page and scroll down to “Leadership.” The videos are in the right hand column.

USING SOCIAL MEDIA TO ATTRACT NEW MEMBERS DURING PANDEMIC

Member recruitment and engagement have become top priorities for organizations everywhere especially during the COVID-19 pandemic. Engagement defines how an individual is participating online – that is how many websites are visited, pages viewed and mentioning in social media. Social media may only be part of the membership equation but it is increasingly becoming a very important part. Let’s talk about how clubs can use social media to recruit, engage their members and grow their membership. Due to isolation and “stay at home” orders – more people are utilizing social media.

Many clubs get into the habit of using social media to “make announcements” to their club members and other Altrusans. They are creating a monologue and not a dialogue. Social media needs to be used for “two-way” dialogues.

In order to engage online, (likes, discussions and shares) you need to have a lot of followers to utilize the content and get a conversation going. Most clubs are followed by their members but your followers need to expand to their friends and other interested parties. Every possible venue needs to be used to grow your social media followers: make announcements at your general meetings and all events about your social media outlets, have your webmaster add social profile gadgets to your website, add social media links to newsletters, emails and invitations and add your social media account information to brochures, marketing materials, recruitment materials and new membership information.

Many clubs have mentioned the need to add younger members to their club membership. As a club understand your target audience for potential members and supporters. Take the time to find out where these potential members are “hanging out” online and what their habits are. One way to find out is to send a quick survey to your membership to find out their habits. The important information is – what kinds of social media channels are used, the content in which they are interested and the time of table they are on social media.

Our clubs run on the hard work of our members. This makes our time and resources to be very valuable commodities so instead of dumping your information on every social media channel focus on the ones that will benefit your club the most. Create a strategy for one or two social media channels.

Social media is always changing. Form a social media committee and take the time to understand the current social media channels out there and which ones will suit your club’s needs the most. Have multiple club members post, update and maintain your social media channels.

- **Facebook** – primarily is used to connect with friends and share pictures.
- **Twitter** – is for broadcasting short messages to the world in hopes they are useful and interesting (Twitter Inc., 03/21/2006)
- **Instagram** – is a social networking app made for sharing pictures and videos from a smartphone (
- **YouTube** – Video- sharing website
- **Snapchat** – is a Smartphone app allowing users to send and receive pictures and videos that will self-destruct (
- **LinkedIn** – is a business and employment-oriented social networking services that operates via apps for smartphones as well as websites
- **YouTube** is an excellent site for making a slideshow or video to display your pictures, captions and comments regarding a successful event whereas twitter or **LinkedIn** may be utilized for letting members and the communities know about upcoming events.

In July 2020, our Altrusa International project "Support Our Soldiers" was blessed by generous support from members. Hundreds of items to send to active duty military members were gathered. We also donated \$200 to their organization. Donations were sent to "Packages From Home" a 501(c) 3 nonprofit organization whose mission is to send care and comfort packages to deployed American military heroes stationed in active duty theaters around the world to boost their morale.

Our club held a Days for Girls sewing/assembly gatherings (with face coverings and physical distancing). Members also sewed face masks for our community. For Bishop Care Center, members wrote cards thanking fulltime staff for their hard work and provided residents with post cards, puzzles, hair care items, and other items to make their stay at the care center more enjoyable during this difficult time.

We would also like to congratulate the Reno/Sparks Club. The quest to build a club began in 2017, as they achieved charter strength of 15 members in August.



Altrusa Chula Vista

Chula Vista Altrusa International of Chula Vista members are making a difference out in the community and from the safety of their homes. Funded by a \$2,000 grant from the Altrusa International Foundation and a \$500 contribution from our Club Foundation, we set up a creative library and wellness area at Alta Vista Academy, a school for foster youth with behavioral and academic issues and students on probation. Members teamed up to purchase over 100 books, along with



art supplies, games, and puzzles; and sorted, labeled, and shelved them. The school purchased additional shelving units and storage bins and will be ordering sensory items and other furniture for the space. This will be a safe space for “self-regulation so that students can rejoin the academic learning environment,” per Hillary Sloan, the director of the agency contracted to provide behavioral support inside the classrooms. Additionally, small groups and individual members have been participating in various community service projects. Throughout the summer, a few members recorded read-aloud books for students at a local elementary school. Carmen Richardson helped unload cases of diapers for distribution to Child Development Associates’ low-income

families and clients on June 24, and the diapers were distributed in July. Active and potential members walked on a local trail on September 19, enjoying each other’s company for the first time in months while picking up trash for “Coastal Cleanup Month.”

Some club members are buying selected Kellogg’s products for Kellogg’s Feeding Reading program and receiving up to ten free books in return for each product purchased. Members plan on donating the Kellogg’s food to Alta Vista Academy and a food distribution program for seniors, and the books to a local Title I school. In other efforts to help seniors, Alana Wilson signed up to be a pen pal with a local resident home to help them feel connected while isolated from their families due to COVID restrictions and other members are donating items for the senior resident homes. In light of COVID, our ASTRA Club, in collaboration with the Chula Vista Police Department, has been distributing food, hygiene products, and gift cards to assist students in need to take away the burden so they may continue to pursue their educational goals. For S.O.S., a



a couple members are creating blank greeting cards to help our Service Members communicate with their loved ones and writing letters of encouragement for service members and first responders. It’s a rewarding and relaxing project and is also a welcome way to spend time with family. Helen Nosal sewed and donated 500 military-themed masks for service members and their families. Luckily, we held our annual fundraiser at the beginning of the year and were able to grant \$20,000 in grants. We awarded \$15,000 to Reading Legacies for the expansion of their Family Connections program to create happy and healing conversations between inmates at RJ Donovan State Prison Facility in Otay Mesa and their families, specifically their children, through reading children’s books via video production through the efforts of volunteers. This fall, we will be discussing how our members can be volunteers for this project. The remaining \$5,000 was awarded to Meals on Wheels to home-deliver meals to 711 seniors in the South Bay, including daily safety checks and social visits, as well as care navigator support and follow-up care. Not only did we distribute these grant funds, but we also held a grant writing workshop for our applicants. It made our decisions much more difficult with so many quality



projects and well-written applications, but our applicants greatly appreciated the insight provided by our Service Committee Co-Chair, Lillian Leopold.

Altrusa of Chula Vista participated in Operation Gratitude sending notes to service members who might feel forgotten. One member made masks to be given out to local service members and veterans.

I would like to spotlight a special Club member - Deanna Jones-Gutierrez. Deanna is currently the Vice-President of our Club. She served a short time as Secretary and as a past ASTRA advisor. Friday, September 18, 2020, I had the pleasure of attending a “Words to Live by Speaker” Zoom presentation, The Essential Need for Travel in Honor of World Peace Day with Deanna L. Jones, MA. Deanna is a Fulbright 2019 recipient to Morocco and avid traveler who uses her journeys to learn about the cultures she visits. She is a former archaeologist and currently the history department Chair at El Camino Junior High School. Deanna is the co-founder of *Connected +Atlas*; a website dedicated to promoting safe and informed travel to adventurers and culture enthusiasts alike. Anaheim High School Teacher and Altrusan, Lisa Clark, faced a real dilemma when Anaheim high School district decided to start the school year virtually. Lisa teaches child development and pre-school through the Orange County ROP program. She normally runs a pre-school during the school year so that her students have hands on experience dealing with children. Her pre-school curriculum involves 4-5 art or science projects a day. Most of her students are of Latino decent and have younger siblings or nieces and nephews. Lisa could teach them the art and science projects but her students did not have access to the supplies that they needed since they were not physically attending school. Her ROP administrator encouraged her to make drop kits for her students. Lisa was overwhelmed when she investigated the cost of the supplies and her ROP offered no financial help. Frustrated for her students, Lisa came to her Anaheim Altrusa club. The club members unanimously voted to finance and build the kits. The supplies were ordered through Amazon Smile so the Altrusa Foundation received a percentage of the cost of the items ordered. Anaheim Altrusan, Reon Boydston Howard opened up her Realty office on two Sundays to allow the club members to meet and assemble the kits. Thanks to club members for approving the making of the drop kits for



Lisa’s students. The kits contained paper, pencils, markers, construction paper, and two types of glue, glitter, coloring, scissors, books and other art items. The science kits contained flour, cream of tartar, salt, oil and Kool-Aid power for coloring. The Anaheim club handed the kits out to Lisa’s students on September 1st and 15th. The students were so appreciative and excited to receive them. Most of them will use the supplies and Lisa’s lessons while they babysit their younger siblings and nieces and nephews during the pandemic.



Altrusa of Tucson

Despite the pandemic and restrictions it places on everyone and despite one of the hottest summers on record, members of Altrusa International of Tucson, Inc., have had a busy few months. In July a “car parade” was formed to pick up and deliver toiletry and clothing donations for the Sister Jose Women’s Center, a local women’s shelter. Membership was divided geographically into three A-Pal groups, and a couple members from each group collected items and delivered 5 carloads of donations. At the September program/business meeting, the Executive Director of Sister Jose, Ms. Jean Fedigan, spoke to the membership about the highly regarded organization via a Zoom presentation.

Members are also engaged in a monthly “Love Note” project, where each member writes 8 notes/month to residents and/or staff of a nursing home. Nursing homes are not allowing in-person visits, and the local Health Department has encouraged people to send notes and letters to isolated members of our community, assuring them they haven’t been forgotten. The Club is sending letters to two different nursing homes, and rotating members of the A-Pal groups are picking up and delivering the notes on a monthly basis.

The Club is also going forward with a Make-A-Difference Day project, October 24. Members will organize supplies for the local Fisher House, on the grounds of the VA Hospital, and bake single-serving desserts for the families of veterans and service members receiving treatment at the VA Hospital.

Just recently they also took in the families of the tragic sinking of the eight Marines and one sailor who died on July 30, when their amphibious assault vehicle sank in 400 feet of water during a shore to ship maneuver. Our donations of non-perishable items arrived just at the right time.

Project Linus was temporarily shut down to distributions and Ursula's house was quickly filling up. All our regular quilters, knitters, and crocheters kept themselves busy at home during quarantine. Since the beginning of the Pandemic in March through October 2nd 129 blankies have been distributed to agencies to give to children directly impacted. As Linus says, "Security is a Warm Blanket!"



Ursula reports more has come in in the past two weeks, so we will have another distribution ready soon.

Another group of ladies has been busy writing "Letters Against Isolation" as part of a national outreach program started under Covid-19. As of a September, they created 690 cards and letters. Most of the cards have been handmade and each letter is hand written. Members have been stamping, coloring, stickering, using scrapbook materials, and repurposing old cards. We applaud their creativity! Our Make a Difference Day project has evolved into writing 146 cards for an autumn and Thanksgiving mailing to Senior Centers. We hope to have every member participate in this project.

ASTRA OF PIONEER VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL

Here is a little bit of background about our club-
ASTRA of PVHS started in 2007. Our club also has an ASTRA Club at Righetti High School which started in 2012. Some of the many ASTRA

PVHS projects, throughout the years, are helping the Food Bank glean fruit and vegetables once a month; volunteering at THRIVE, which is a food bank distribution center held every two weeks. Parents bring their children and ASTRA keeps the kids occupied with crafts and books while the parents attend the learning centers; Autism Walk in March; Good Samaritan Recovery Day, members give out books to kids and adults and play games with a prize; Open Streets, for one day, a busy street is closed down and the community is allowed to bike, walk, and enjoy the non-profit organization resource tables, food stalls, and face painting by ASTRA. Helping "Angels Bearing Gifts" wrap Christmas gifts for mentally disabled/challenged adults; we also volunteer to help other organizations with their projects. And, of course, we help our sponsoring club, Altrusa of the Central Coast, Inc. with their major fundraiser, Festival of Trees. We are thankful that our sponsoring club has a foundation that provides an ASTRA scholarship for graduating seniors. This year there were five applicants and five received scholarships. These recipients were in the ASTRA Club all four years and excelled in their studies and community service projects. ASTRA is truly "Growing in Service."

How do we garner new ASTRA members at the beginning of each school year?

Our school district holds an 8th grade, junior high, motivational program called "Pathway to Success" that is held in the spring, once a year. They are held at three different junior high schools. This program helps prepare 8th graders pursue a college education. After the scheduled programs parents and students are encouraged to peruse the various community resource organization tables that provide service and activities for students throughout the community.

ASTRA of PVHS members picked this project because they remember when they attended one of the junior high school Pathway to Success Programs. At that time, the students left the motivational meeting with a greater understanding of the value of an education and that there was a campus club that would help them achieve their educational goals. Some of the current ASTRA members joined the club after hearing the ASTRA Club presentation.

So, the resource table of the ASTRA Club project committee was organized and the students chose what they would hand out and display at their resource tables. They created ASTRA 4x6 cards that showed what ASTRA was about; they handed out ASTRA buttons, pencils and reading books. Four bilingual ASTRA members talked to parents about the importance of joining the ASTRA club at the high school level because community service hours are important for scholarship applications, opportunity to be a leader, and applying for ASTRA scholarship.



We always have a very large group join at the beginning of the year. These new members are from the junior high schools where we did our presentation. The seasoned ASTRA members welcome the new ASTRA members and "buddy up" with them so they know what is expected of them. The new members are immediately put to work on a project.

A quote from Evelyn Letona Robles, an ASTRA Pioneer Valley High School member:

"High school has enriched me with a plethora of educational experiences and extra curriculars, yet ASTRA Club remains one of the most influential groups I've ever had the pleasure of joining. I'm inspired by the amazing inclusivity and positivity that ASTRA coordinator Melinda promotes during every meeting. I am passionate about assisting and bettering our community, and it has been a pleasure, meeting other students who share this same passion. While I am very appreciative of the community service opportunities I have been presented with the other members, I am also thankful for the platform ASTRA has given me to enhance my leadership and speech skills. I refuse to acknowledge ASTRA as a simple community service organization. It's become a safe space where my fellow agents of change and I feel comfortable collaborating for the wellbeing of our community."
